Uniform

Please note:

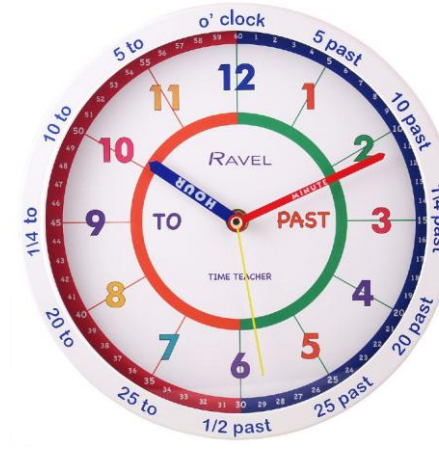
- ▶ Trainers may be worn but they must be PLAIN BLACK only with no coloured markings at all.
- ▶ Black leggings and cycling shorts are NOT school uniform and must NOT be worn as such.
- ▶ Trousers and skirts must be mid-grey school uniform trousers and skirts.
- ▶ Blue IHJS hoodies can be purchased from the uniform providers and may be worn inside school.

We have also made a change to our school uniform policy:

- ▶ On the days that classes have PE, children may come to school wearing their PE kits of blue shorts and their house T-shirt.
 - ▶ On cold days, children may wear PLAIN black or blue track bottoms and their IHJS sweatshirt.

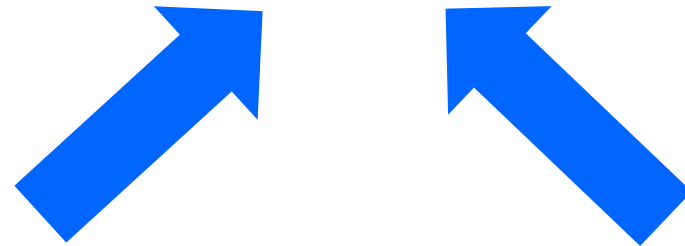

Behaviour

At IHJS we use our 'We are Proud of You' reward system to recognise children's high standards of behaviour. We identify 2 equally important elements to good behaviour.

Ambassador Behaviour



Conduct:

- Being polite
- kind
- lining up quietly
- sharing and taking turns
- following instructions
- etc



Learning Attitude:

- Actively listening in class
- joining in with discussions
- starting tasks straight away
- completing as much of the learning as you can
- completing tasks to the best standard you can
- etc.

Celebrating good behaviour

- When a child demonstrates **both** good conduct and learning attitude consistently over most of a day, their name will go on the Name & Fame wall in the classroom.
- If their name stays on the wall, at the end of the day, they will earn a ‘We are Proud of You’ stamp in their homework diary.
- If they earn stamps for 5 consecutive days (from Friday - Thursday of the following week), they will:
 - be mentioned in our Celebration Assembly on Friday
 - have their name printed on the Name & Fame Wall on the ground floor
 - Earn an extra playtime with Mrs. Anglin

Miss Ryan holds a weekly assembly to identify, develop and celebrate the features of good behavior within our school. This will help the children succeed in earning their ‘We are Proud of You’ stamp.

Inappropriate behaviour

- Children will receive a warning should they demonstrate behaviour that is disruptive to themselves or others
- Continuous behaviour that is disruptive to themselves or others will result in a green card, which will be stuck into their homework diary for parents/carers to see and sign.
- Behaviour that is rude or unkind to others will result in an orange card, which will be stuck into their homework diary for parents/carers to see and sign.
- Serious or dangerous behaviour will result in a Red card. At this time you will be contacted by either an Assistant Head Teacher or the Head teacher to discuss the situation and the sanctions implemented.

Communication

Good communication is vital between child, parents and school.

Key messages:

- Your child's class teacher is your main point of contact for the vast majority of communications
- Contact should mainly be through using your child's Homework Diary
- You may also speak to your child's teacher at the end of the school day on the playground
- If there is something sensitive or urgent, please contact the school office to arrange a call back from or an appointment with the class teacher
- Please do NOT try to speak to the class teacher on drop-off as all staff are busy settling your children in ready for the school day
- Medical appointments should also be shown to Mrs. O'Donoghue in the school office

Other messages:

- A weekly Newsletter will be sent at the end of each week which will contain some information for upcoming events as well as celebrations for things that have happened in school that week
- Also look at the school calendar on the school website - do not look at term dates as this is Bucks and does not include INSET days
- Mrs. Anglin will send out a half-termly list of key dates

Home learning

We have based our home learning approach on educational research as well as our observations on what supports better outcomes for children in this school.

Each week we expect your child to:

- ▶ Read for 10 minutes a day Monday-Friday
- ▶ Learn their weekly spellings
- ▶ Spellings quizzes will be held on a selection of spellings every Friday
- ▶ Complete daily sessions of 10 minutes on ttrackstars

- ▶ Occasionally, the class teacher may set an additional task to consolidate something the class have learned or prepare them for an upcoming lesson/unit.
 - ▶ E.g. a screen time diary for internet safety lessons.
- ▶ We recognize that some parents like their children to have access to additional learning opportunities outside of school so we have set up a learning zone page on our website, which has a wide range of links for websites that can support you in this.

Attendance

Research has shown that good attendance and punctuality are vital to success.

Attendance below 90% is identified as persistent absenteeism by the Government.

As per government requirements, we have a new attendance policy. Schools are now expected to send details of persistent or unauthorised absence to the local authority for fining. For example, if you book a week's holiday (10 sessions) during term-time you may now be fined £80 per parent per child. If this is not paid within 21 days, the fine could go up to £160 and beyond!

Celebrating Success

At Iver Heath Junior School we feel it is important to reward children who have achieved good or improved attendance. Our weekly 'Attendance Challenge' allows classes to celebrate their collective attendance successes. When a class wins the 'Attendance Challenge' by achieving 100% attendance for the previous week, this will be announced in our 'Celebration Assembly' and they will receive a mufti day.

Any child who achieves 100% attendance for a term will receive a book token and a mention in the school newsletter.

Punctuality

Punctuality is a life-skill.

If learners are late, it could seriously affect their learning.
